Sgt. Imhof

- Welcomed everyone to the community meeting and advised that there were several presentations schedule for the meeting.
- Advised he is currently the Crime Prevention Sergeant; however, in a couple weeks he will be promoted and will be replacing Lt. Megenney who is retiring. If you have any questions or concerns you a hold of him at Lt. Megenney's old phone number (909) 356-7142.
- Introduced the following members from City departments in attendance: Councilman Jesse Sandoval, Councilwoman Lydia Wibert Salazar, School Board member Matt Slowik, School Board member Jasmine Hall.
- Summer Concerts in the park are Thursday nights from 7-9 pm at Miller Park.
- August 7th will be the last car show for the summer
- National Night Out is August 4th

Officer Rick Bellis-Department of Fish and Wildlife

- The primary predator type animals in this general location are coyotes, mountain lions, and bears.
- Coyotes-
 - There are more coyotes now than there was in 1800.
 - They now live everywhere.

- They eat livestock, poultry, trash, dog food, berries, foxes, snakes, and rodents.
 - Mainly active during the night. You will probably see them from dusk to dawn.
 - They can weigh up to 45 lbs and they have small pointed ears and are usually gray or brown in color.
 - They breed between February and March, the pups are learned not to fear people.
 - They likely associate people as an easy food source.
 - Will usually go after smaller dogs and cats unless they are in a pack then they will take on a larger dog.
- **Black Bears-**
 - All bears in California are black bears
 - They occupy all mountain ranges in the state.
 - Usually stand about 5 to 6 feet and can weigh up to 600 lbs.
 - Lives up to 30 years.
 - They are omnivorous and will eat anything and everything
 - They have great vision and they see in color.
 - Their hearing is twice the capacity of a human.
 - Generally solitary animals unless it's a mam bear with her cubs.
 - The state wide bear population is increasing and is currently about 30,000.
 - Be bear aware-do not put trash outside, make sure you wrap food up.
 - It's a people problem not a bear problem.
 - Bears are attracted to anything smelly, such as beehives, orchards, gardens, and livestock.
 - Make sure you securely close locking dumpsters.
 - If you encounter a bear:
 - Do not run
 - Give the bear plenty of room
 - Stand and face the animal
 - Look large
 - Back away slowly
- **Mountain Lions-**
 - When a lion kills something they will clamp on the back of the head and crush the skull.
 - Males weigh up to 165 lbs and females can weigh up to 100 lbs
 - They live up to 12 years in the wild and 30 years in captivity
 - They hunt but they also kill for the sake of killing, so if you see a freshly killed deer there is probably a mountain lion nearby.
 - Each deer requires 8 to 10 lbs of meat per day.
 - Their diet consists of deer, elk, porcupines, small mammals, livestock, and pets.
 - Avoid hiking or jogging between dusk and dawn.

- If you encounter a mountain lion:
 - Do not run
 - Look big
 - Throw rocks at it
 - Do not turn your back to it
 - Make loud noises
 - If attacked fight back, they are not looking for a fight.
- Do not feed deer. Deer attract mountain lions.
- Do not leave pets outside
- What does the Department of Fish and Wildlife do:
 - Assess potential human conflict
 - Advise on preventative measures
 - Investigate depredation
 - Evaluation of recurrent nuisance activity
 - Respond to public safety incidents, injured or orphaned wildlife
- If they do issue a depredation permit you will need to kill the animal or hire someone to kill them for you.
- Mountain lion attacks on humans are very rare.
- Studies have shown relocation does not help anything it just creates continued nuisance behavior or death of the animal from them trying to return to the area they know.
- In California there are only black bears not grizzly bears. They will not attack a human unless they feel they are in danger or are looking for food.
- If you live in the area where you are visited by deer do not feed them, it is illegal plus deer will attract mountain lions. You can deer proof your landscaping by avoiding plants that deer like to eat. Trim brush to reduce hiding places and do not leave small children or pets outside unattended between dawn and dusk.
- If you see a mountain lion do not approach it, don't run, face the animal and make noise. You want to make yourself look bigger, throw rocks and if attacked fight back.
- Never feed or attempt to tame a coyote.

Erik Garwick-Public Works Parks and Landscape

- The city manages over 23 million square feet (530 acres) of irrigated landscaped area
- 459 water meters
- 489 irrigation controllers
- The city knows how much water to use at a park by figuring out how much water we lost due to evapotranspiration. Then they have to determine which sprinkler system would be better to how many inches of water a set sprinkler at that location can apply to the property.
- The city only wants to apply the amount of water needed, so we created a water budget for each meter.

- The city has programmed the field controllers to come on based on how many minutes it takes to meet the water budget for a particular day.
- To help us manage water we also use GIS technology to create a tool that compares water budget targets to actual water use.
- What can you do as a resident:
 - Visiting your local water agency's website to take advantage of rebates and offers that might be available for residential homes.
 - Follow all drought regulations as described on your local water agency's website
 - Pay close attention to your water usage and minimize water use wherever possible.

- Vehicle theft and break ins are a continual problem city wide. If you have a car alarm makes sure you set it. If you see someone in your area you know does not belong there please do not hesitate to call dispatch to have an officer check it out.

Questions and Concerns of the Residents of Area 1:

What is the status of the mountain lion who attacked the dog in Hunter's Ridge? About a mile from here a man shot a mountain lion who was attacking his goats. There is no confirmation that this was the same mountain lion however it is highly likely that it was the same one.

If someone encounters a bear are they supposed to act big? If someone encounters a bear they should make noise and act big, if they are attacked you have to fight back and fight it off.

What if the coyotes are not scared of noise? You have to remove the incentive for them being in your neighborhood. Pick up your pet's food when they are done eating and their water bowl too. Do not leave small pets outside unattended. Never turn your back on them, throw rocks at them if you have to.

What are the chances of a coyote breaking through a screen door to get food or to get to your pet? It is not likely they will break through your screen door.

Where does the city get their water from? Erik Garwick stated most of the water used is potable however some of the water is reclaimed. The city has changed watering times to follow the water restriction just like everyone else.

The sprinklers on Bridle Path along Frontage the sprinklers are shooting everywhere and they are on like every day. Erik Garwick advised the sprinklers should not be on every day they should only be turning on 2 days a week.

With the new water restrictions are we going to be getting back a refund because we won't be using so much in water costs. The landscaping maintenance fund only one small part of that goes to the water. That money is used to maintain that specific district and if the money isn't used on water it will be used to maintain the district in another way.

This was by far the worst year with fireworks. Sgt. Imhof advised we put out as much man power as we could. We had over 50 officers in addition to our normal patrol officers out the night of the 4th of July. A couple of years ago there was a vote out there to ban all fireworks safe and sane ones however that vote did not pass. If people are still lighting them off please call our dispatch.

Statistically when the overpass opens up at Duncan Canyon, how much more crime can the residents of Hunter's Ridge expect? Sgt. Imhof advised there is no way to know. For sure we will monitor traffic and it is probably unlikely that there will be an increase in crime in the area.

Thanked Fontana Pd for putting officers at the overpass but thought it might be a better idea for them to have a security guard at the location rather than a police officer.

Does the police department do background checks on the people who volunteer for vacation patrol. Sgt. Imhof advised all of our volunteers do have a background check done. They are good people.

When they do vacation patrol how often do they go through the neighborhood. They will patrol the neighborhood at least once a day but could be more just depending on how many are on patrol that day.

Why can't Lytle Creek Road to Duncan Canyon North be opened. Dave Teater with Traffic Engineering advised he will have to research that and get an answer for him at a later date.

- She is the area commander for Area 4, which is everything south of the 10 freeway.

Planning-Dawn Rowe and Paul Gonzales

- The city recently annexed the area of Kaiser to Mulberry and Jurupa to the 10 freeway. It is considered the Almond Avenue Annexation.

- This annexation consisted of 486 acres-the majority of the area is zoned for industrial, however the area closest to Southridge will be zoned for lighter industrial.
- There are 150 property owners and about 393 people who live in this area.
- There are still lots of undeveloped land in this annexation.
- Currently 17 properties are considered residential trucking districts.
- Benefits of this area becoming City:
 - Police Services
 - Animal Control Services
 - Code Compliance
 - Street Sweeping service
 - Street Maintenance
- Code Compliance took over 26 open code cases from the county in this area.
- We annexed in the Fed Ex facility.
- Currently there are a lot of residential businesses in that area and each one will be treated when they are brought up on a case by case basis. It will depend on the permitting done by the county.

Questions and Concerns of the Residents of Area 4:

Asked if the split has been done where ½ of Bloomington would Fontana and the other ½ will be Colton.

Paul Gonzales advised Bloomington is not in our sphere of influence it will always either be county or possibly Rialto.

Does the newly annexed area still have septic tanks?

Paul Gonzales advised they probably still do however in the future they will have the ability to connect to the sewer.

Were the residents who are affected by this notified of the annexation by mail?

Dawn Rowe with Planning advised yes all the property owners were notified. Each one received a welcome packet with some city resource information.

What are the city's plan regarding the sidewalk and bus benches on Jurupa from Sierra to Cherry.

As developers start to come it and submit plans once those plans are approved it will be required of them to provide the sidewalks, as far as the benches for the buses that would be up to Omintrans. They city does not have any control over if they put in a bench there or not.

She has problems with kids parking on her street and drinking and smoking.

Lt. Stover advised if we know there is a repetitive issue such as this happening we will be able to address the issue. Any time they are parked there give us a call and have an officer go out to the location. We would like to handle these situations before they get too big.

There is a problem with homeless in Southridge. As well as graffiti along the water tower along the service road.

Asked what was being built on Citrus and Jurupa near Santa Ana.

Paul Gonzales advised there is currently an application that is going to the planning commission in December. They are planning on building 3 large industrial buildings.

Advised she was walking in Southridge Village Park between 8:30 to 9am and there was a group of boys not sure if they were high school or middle school. They were at the park smoking marijuana. Asked what should she do if she sees this again?

Lt. Stover advised you can call either Fontana Police Department or if they look like they are school aged children and it is during school hours you can call the Fontana School Police Department.

Advised Bloomington High School has late start every Wednesday so they may have been students from Bloomington High School.

Lt. Stover advised if it is in progress you can go ahead and call our police department dispatch.

At Jurupa Vista Elementary School they did a drive thru pickup and drop off zone and now the curbs are painted red. There are no longer any crossing guards at the location, it is getting dangerous for the kids out there.

Lauren Popescu advised he just recently did a survey out there upon request from the principal and the volume was too low to warrant a crossing guard. The school district stopped having crossing guards due to the budgets constraints. Cpl. Schlotterbeck

Lt. Aulis

Advised the former Area Commander Lt. Ratcliffe recently retired and he has taken his place.

Has worked 25 years at the police department in numerous assignments to include bike unit, k9 handler, internal affairs and code enforcement.

As an ongoing commitment to the city and in an effort to improve law enforcement services to citizens the area commander program was created. The area commander program was designed to enhance current community-oriented policing methods. The city is broken up into four areas and each of those areas are assigned an area commander to deal with the quality of life issues. If you don't know who to call with a problem in the city you can always call your area commander and he will assist you.

Introductions- Community Services Jenny Espinoza, Public Works Sergio Quioz, Enviromental Services Kim Cameron, and Traffic Engineering Dave Teater.

If you haven't checked out the City of Fontana's Website lately you might want to there is lots of information on the website, such as the Car show which is the 1st Friday of every month through September and the farmers market which is every Saturday.

The new DMV office opened up today on Foothill and hemlock. The old one is now closed on Merrill.

Mayor Acquanetta Warren

- Advised we are living in an exciting times.
- She got an email from four people who said they were not going to come to the meeting because they were happy.

Sharon Mitchell-Burrtec Waste Management

- In 2011, American generated about 250 million tons of trash and recycled and composted almost 87 million tons of this material.
- Average disposal is about 5lbs per person per day.

Lt. Aulis-K9 Program

- The main reason we use dogs is to sniff out drugs.
- Our K9's are very social.

- They have a strong sense of smell. To give you an example: Chocolate cake, we just smell chocolate cake but the dog will smell the eggs, the flour, the sugar, etc all the ingredients that went into making that chocolate cake.
- They are very disciplined and very dependable.
- Recently dogs have even been noted to smell the body change in a diabetic when their blood sugar is low.
- Fontana Police Department has the largest K9 unit in the county. We have 6 dogs.
- We put two dogs out every day.
- Right now we have 5 dogs that are actually on patrol teams and 1 dog who is assigned to our narcotics unit. We would like to extend that.
- K9 pals are a nonprofit organization which was formed to provide financial support to the Fontana Police K9 unit.
 - Since 1990 they have purchased 15 police canines as well as vital equipment needed to train our dogs.
 - Over the past 3 years the K9 pals have supported the K9 unit's efforts to develop/build a training center which is now in full operation and has served k9 units from all over Southern California.

Questions and Concerns of the Residents of Area 2 West:

Can Styrofoam be recycled? Sharon advised it can be recycled.

Do residents have to wash out the cans when they are recycled? Sharon advised Burttec does ask you give them a quick rinse to get any food waste off them.

Can the bags the newspapers come in be recycled? Sharon advised Burrtec recommend saving those and taking them into Wal-Mart or a grocery store where they have a recycle bin specifically for plastic bags.

When the trash cans are placed at the curb are they now the city's property. Sharon advised yes once they are placed at the curb they are now the property of the city and Burrtec.

How do you train a dog to sniff drugs? Do you give him the drugs so he craves it? Lt. Aulis advised no we do not. Any amount of drugs given to a dog could kill him. We train them with a toy so they can associate the smell with a reward being his toy.

If it is raining does that effect the dog's sense of smell? It could hinder it a little bit but they will eventually find it.

Do the officers get to take the dog home? Yes they do, the dog is like a part of the family.

Where do the dogs go when they retire? They stay with their current handler. The handler does about 6 or 7 years in this assignment. We have to have handlers with the best judgment

There has been a rash of egg throwing and breaking of car windows between 2am and 6am. Lt. Aulis advised he will have to pull the calls for service to see if there is a trend but sometimes people do not report those types of things to us. We have Coplink where you can now file a report online. There is even a kiosk in the Police department lobby which allows you to report a crime.

Do you ever use the k9's to find missing children. We can use them for that but the Sheriff's department actually have a blood hound we would use if we needed to utilize a dog for that matter.

At Foothill and Mulberry they recently changed the traffic pattern however no signed was put up notifying right turn only lane. Traffic Engineering Dave Teater advised he is not sure why that happened but he will check on it.

When their neighbor waters their grass it floods his area, what can be done. You can call Code Compliance however the only problem is they will have to see that it is impacting your property.

On Foothill and East there is that really pretty waterfall fountain however if you are going east you cannot see it. What can be done to increase visibility? The other side of the street is Rancho Cucamonga. We will have to see what we can do to increase visibility.

On the trail at Foothill and East sometimes there is broken glass on the sidewalk for weeks. Sergio Quiroz with Public Works stated the landscapers are supposed to be picking up broken glass. He will make sure they address that issue.

There are about 8 or 9 dead trees on East Liberty from Banana to Roanoake. Also the sprinklers are watering the street instead of the parkway. You can call 428-PARK to report the issues so they can be taken care of.

Lives on Bennington Court and a No Outlet sign was installed was wondering why that was? Dave Teater with Traffic Engineering advised it was probably because it was requested and due to the traffic going into the area.
